A Note from the Pastor

Last week on Wednesday Night, we took up an additional question about prayer: How should we think about people that are always talking about praying, but their prayers seem petty or self-centered? What does God think when we pray things like, "Please let the light be green so I'm not late," or, "Lord, don't let them notice me in the bread aisle, I really don't want to talk to them today," or, "Jesus, please let it be a good hair day?"

In one sense, I think God is always glad to have us pray. To be in conversation with God is better than not to be! And God cares; God *really* cares about even the most mundane aspects of our lives. He knows the number of hairs on our head, after all. So, we should feel comfortable praying about whatever is on our heart. And we don't have to filter our prayers so that we only offer our most pious and righteous thoughts to God. God's perfect judgment means that he'll know what to do with even our impious requests. And the Spirit always intercedes for us when we don't have the right words ourselves.

In another sense, we should be aware that God's answers to our prayers might bounce back to us in the form of conviction of sin or invitation to service. When the Spirit bears its fruit in our lives, we should expect our prayers to take a different shape too. They might grow in gratitude as we become more aware of God's great love for us. They might be more oriented towards the needs of our neighbors as we love them as ourselves. Our praise of God might become more theologically rich because we have grown in our understanding of God. We might be more inclined to confess, because God has convicted us about things that need to change in our lives.

There's perhaps no better way to get a sense for what we really believe than to pay attention to what we pray for. If we rarely pray, do we likely wonder somewhere in our hearts if God cares what we have to say. If our prayer is always requests, we might think that God exists to serve our needs rather than the other way around.

How do you pray? What anxieties do you have about prayer? If you'd ever like to talk about those things, I can't imagine a better use of my time than to think through praying with you.


